FROM RABBI DANIEL KAIMAN

INVOCATION

On Sunday afternoon, October 15, Rabbi Kaiman delivered an invocation at the Simchat Torah Massacre memorial event in Liberator's Park. Below is the text of that moving piece.

Yesterday morning, Jews worldwide began reading the Book of Genesis. After the high holidays. After the festivities. This is how we start our year. At the very beginning of our story.

We finish. We celebrate. And then we begin again, living out the cycle that promises continuity and connection across generations. This afternoon we find ourselves caught in a swirling cycle. Spinning, and twirling. But knowing we must begin again.

A story is told about the creation of humankind.

And God said, "Let us make humankind in our image, after our likeness."

And God created humankind in the divine image, creating it in the image of God—creating them male and female.

All of us are made in the image of God.

What could this mean? Often, we say that to harm any person is to harm the godliness inherent within them. Therefore, in doing harm to another, we are harming God.

It's a nice idea for most moments. But at times like this, when grandmothers are held hostage, when children's lives are stolen, when safety and innocence are shattered, we cannot be blind to the actions of the human beings who carry out these horrors. Are we to say they are made in the image of God? Are we to say that those who inflict harm on another represent the divine?

I cannot.

So, what does Torah mean when it states that God created humankind in the image of God?

It means all of us have the potential for godliness. But it is a quality that must be developed by each person. Sometimes context, trauma, and history cloud our judgment. Sometimes systems, sickness, and cynicism get in the way of that potential. And that leads us to moments like we mourn today.

But Torah reminds us that everyone has the potential for godliness. A holy task is to seek and see that reality in another. Everyone has the potential for healing and hope.

For me, this moment is not about policy or strategy. For me, what we come to do this afternoon is remind ourselves and

each other of our shared potential, even when we hurt. Even when we are scared, we can never lose sight of our shared humanity. We can never stop striving for a better world.

May this gathering be one of strength and peace. May safety and security be realized for all. And may we always be reminded that we each have the potential to realize godliness.

FROM RABBI MARC B. FITZERMAN

SIGNS AND SYMBOLS

For almost twenty centuries, the Jews of Rome have made their peace with the city by carefully avoiding one of its signature monuments. The Arch of Titus sits near the Colliseum as a reminder of the sack of Jerusalem in 70 C.E. It bears the famous image of Roman soliders looting the treasures of the Second Temple. The insult is amplified by a scrum of Jewish slaves, the human prize of Roman aggression in the Land of Israel. When the arch was erected, those slaves had already been sold in the marketplace, then tormented by the imagery of their own enslavement.

But for a brief moment in October, the archway was transformed. Against the background of its own history of oppression, the government of Rome illuminated the Arch of Titus with the colors and iconography of the State of Israel. Along with many of you, I found the sight astonishing. For decades many liberal Europeans have failed the test of empathy, placing Jewish suffering on the lowest tier of concern. But in October, there was a moment of moral clarity, not only in Italy, but Germany, France and elsewhere. It took the slaughter of innocents to prompt it, but it was a moment of clarity all the same. Our own president led the effort of reassurance. No speeches will ever equal the force or sincerity of his remarks

None of us can know where the tragedy and horror of the Simchat Torah Massacre will finally land. I'm writing in the middle days of October. Over 350,000 Israeli soldiers have been mobilized and we are in an agony of waiting, with opinion already turning against the Israeli government. Moral clarity tends to disappear as soon as it coalesces. Meanwhile, Israel is hoping to accomplish what may be impossible: dismantle a cursed, terrorist regime and minimize the loss of innocent civilian life. Many Israelis have bothered to say that even in the midst of terrifying loss, they are aware of the suffering of Palestinian non-combattants.

But I want us also to recall that in the midst of crisis, the world somehow attained a moment of moral balance. Even as it rightly worried about humanitarian concerns, it supported Israel's right to self-defense and to change the nature of its struggle with terrorism. In small ways and large, October will be a turning point, and I pray that days ahead will turn mourning into relief, and grief into a path forward in history.

WHO SHALL LIVE...

...and who shall come down with RSV? Aaaaaargh!

As some of you may know, I spent the end of September and most of October at home in bed with RSV. It's that newly prominent viral illness that is now part of the Big Three of autumn: COVID, Flu, and Respiratory Syncytial Virus Infection. I had all the classic symptoms: cough, fever, wheezing, and decreased appetite. But it was the fatigue that got me. I haven't been myself in well over a month.

So many of you sent your best wishes, but I'm really writing to suggest that you make a conscious decision for or against vaccination. Because I've been talking about RSV obsessively since Yom Kippur, I know that some physicians are in favor of RSV shots and others are opposed. The details are important, but I never like to go beyond the borders of my expertise.

What I can suggest is that you speak to your own physician and get a sense of where s/he stands on this issue. Either way, I'll be rooting for you and your good health this season.


HENRY WATT ON NOVEMBER 18


As we continue to work on perfecting those foundational experiences this year, we've embarked on a new project to keep our kids who have recently graduated from high school and are now at college campuses around the country stay
